Mr. Catone shared that DSS made a request for \$32 million in recurring funds for early care and education. Included in that request was \$3.1 million is for CCDF, \$2.9 million for ABC community scholarships, \$1 million for a trial share pilot, and \$26 million to continue SC Boost.

Ms. Gillum reported on the activities of the ICC.

Ms. Vandervliet reported on the activities of the ECAC.

Ms. Mackey made a motion to adjourn the meeting, seconded by Dr. Williams, and approved unanimously.

1.Increase the percentage of children, ages 0-35 months, who have full immunization coverage from 68.0% to 78.0%.

Staff Report on Early Childhood Advisory Council Activities

Presented April 17, 2025

1. Increase utilization of SC's Early Childhood Resources and Services

A. First Five SC (on-line screener for 40+ publicly funded programs)

First Five SC was recommended by Preschool Development B-5 to be part of a capstone project at University of Maryland School of Public Policy. The Office of Early Childhood Development and the PDG B-5 initiative have partnered with the University of Maryland School of Public Policy's Capstone course. This project allows a student to analyze a topic chosen by PDG B-5 staff. This year PDG B-5 staff proposed reviewing analysis on the progress of states' efforts to develop and implement systems for Coordinated Application, Eligibility and Enrollment (CAEE). Recognition by PDG B-5 staff is important as South Carolina continues work on this important grant.

- **C.** The early childhood system and its partners united to make April 4, **Pre-K Enrollment Day**, a success. A widely shared social media blitz featured a single graphic and message encouraging parents of 4-year-olds to check eligibility and enroll their child in no-cost preschool. The message was posted by four school districts, 13 First Steps 4K centers, ABC Quality, SC Child Care Resource and Referral, and SC Department of Social Services. Additionally, several ECAC agency partners, Children's Trust of SC, SC Department of Health and Human Services, SC Department of Public Health reshared the message.
- **D. Ready for Kindergarten Live** will take place on Friday, April 25 from 12-1. The ECAC and SC First Steps will host a free, hour-long, virtual learning opportunity for families, educators, and advocates, Ready for Kindergarten Live. Speakers Cara Tyrell, a parenting coach, early childhood expert, and mom, and Tomeka Love, Red Bank Elementary's Assistant Principal and South Carolina's Assistant Principal of the Year, will offer practical tips on how schools and families can work together to help children be successful in kindergarten.

2. Support Collaboration within SC's Early Childhood System

The South Carolina Institute of Medicine and Public Health (IMPH), an independent, nonprofit organization working to collectively inform policy to improve health and health care in South Carolina, facilitated a Taskforce of state experts and rural community members focused on access to care for rural South Carolina mothers and infants, led by Taskforce Chair Dr. Lisa Waddell.

According to the South Carolina Department of Public Health (SCDPH), South Carolina's maternal mortality rates have risen to double the national average. The state continues to have poor maternal and infant health outcomes, currently ranking eighth highest for maternal mortality and fifth highest for infant mortality compared to other states.

ECAC was invited to formally support the recommendation. A supporting organization is not required to take action to execute the recommendation, but the designation means that if the recommendation is implemented, the organization may be able to provide some support, whether advising, participating in, or contributing to implementation in some other way.

3. National Collaboration through First Five for All

SC First Steps provides limited technical assistance to other states for the First Five model. This work is funded by solely by the Pritzker Foundation and David and Lucille Packard Foundation. In line with funder expectations, three proposals were submitted and selected to present at the following conferences: National WIC Association Education and Training Conference; Child Care Aware Symposium; and American Public Human Services Association (APHSA) Summit.

Nevada has adopted the model. Colorado has received some support. Texas and Hawaii continue to request technical assistance.
