Parents as Teachers (PAT) is a home visiting program designed to build strong communities, thriving families and children who are healthy, safe and ready to succeed. PAT services include:



Personal visits from a parent educator at least twice monthly



Monthly group connections with other PAT families



an evidence-based program

Screenings and assessments to identify developmental concerns



Connections to outside resources that families may need to succeed



PAT recently received the highest rating from the federal Prevention Services Clearinghouse. This recognition validates the effectiveness of Parents as Teachers as a strategy for improving parenting practices, promoting early detection of developmental delays and health issues, preventing child abuse and neglect, and enhancing school readiness and success.

CHILD CARE SCHOLARSHIPS

an evidence-based program

For many families in Marlboro County, the cost of quality child care is out of reach. Our scholarship program makes payments to child care providers to care for children from low-income families so their parents can return to school or work as well as income-eligible children whose parent attends school or works at least 20 hours per week. In addition to regular monitoring of child care providers that receive First Steps scholarships, First Steps conducts at least one developmental screening each year with scholarship children and connects families to needed services within the community.

- Each one of the participants in our program who receives a scholarship must also participate in the Marlboro County First Steps PAT program
- · Every child who receives a scholarship also receives books

South Carolina First Steps provides eligible children with free enrollment in full-day four-year-old kindergarten programs. In coordination with First Steps local partnerships and more than 200 private, faith- and community-based preschool providers, First Steps 4K expands access to quality child care across the state.




ELIGIBILITY

To qualify for enrollment, a child must:

Be 4 years old on or before September 1



 Live in one of 64 qualifying school districts

4K NEWS

In fiscal year 2019-2020, South Carolina First Steps is launching a pilot program to expand 4K enrollment within underserved communities. Ageand income-eligible children residing in any SC school district may qualify for a slot in a participating center that also serves students from eligible districts.


