Priorities: Summary

Through a series of community convenings, a needs assessment and asset mapping process, the following needs were prioritized for Lee County. See our full needs assessment here:

1.Childcare Desert

44% of Lee County is considered a childcare desert, and there is a need for more Infant and Toddler Childcare in the Lee County Community.

2. Readiness for Kindergarten

Surveys from parents, community service agencies indicate a need for childcare services to ensure children are ready for kindergarten.

3. Parenting and Family Skills

All surveyed including parents indicate a need for parenting skills and family centered childcare counseling included mental health counseling.

4. Local Community Infrastructure

Community responses from surveyed participants continue to identify Transportation as a priority. Also, more high quality and better jobs continue to be identified as a need of the community.

Objectives

- 1. Parents will be engaged in their child (ren) educational activities.
- 2. To ensure children arrive at school ready to learn.
- 3. Ensuring children arrive at school healthy and ready to learn.
- 4. Create a coordinated and Family-Centered Early Childhood System.

Objective One: Parents will be engaged in their child (ren) educational activities.

STRATEGY 1.1

PARENTS TO TEACHERS

Provide families with personal visits from a parent educator at least twice monthly.

SMART GOALS

- Increase the number of families enrolled in the Parents As Teachers Program by 3% each year thru 2026.
- In FY 24, FY 25, and FY 26, LCFS will participate in quarterly recruitment activities at PTA/ Open House, annual back to school events at feeder elementary schools and childcare facilities.

COMMUNITY COLLABORATORS

 Community partners will include the DHEC-WIC program, Lee County Public and the Lee County Department of Social Services. Churches and civic organizations will also be a part of the recruiting process.

Objective One: Parents will be engaged in their child (ren) educational activities.

STRATEGY 1.2

Conduct monthly group connections with other PAT families to share information and connections to outside resources that families may need to succeed.

SMART GOAL

 Conduct at least 12 monthly group sessions with PAT families to share information and resources.

COMMUNITY COLLABORATORS

 Community partners will include DHEC, Department of Social Services, Mental Health, Vroom partners, and other local resource

STRATEGY 1.3

PARENTS AS TEACHERS

SMART GOAL

 Each year, LCFS will provide PAT families with personal visits from a parent educator at least twice monthly.

Objective One: Parents will be engaged in their child (ren) educational activities.

COMMUNUTIY COLLABORATORS

 Community partners will include the DHEC-WIC program, Lee County Public and the Lee County Department of Social Services. Churches and civic organizations will also be a part of the recruiting process.

STRATEGY 1.4

Promote brain building exercises for birth to 5 children through everyday interaction.

SMART GOAL

 Increase the participation level of families served by Raising a Reader Program by 5% by the end of FY26.

COMMUNITY COLLABORATORS

 Community partners will include DHEC, Department of Social Services, Mental Health, and other local resource

Objective Two: To ensure children arrive at school ready to learn.

STRATEGY 2.1

COUNTDOOWN TO KINDERGARTEN

Implement the Countdown to Kindergarten home visitation program pairing the families of rising kindergartens with their future teachers during the summer before school entry.

SMART GOAL

 Train at least 3 teachers each year beginning with FY 24 to conduct home visits with 30 rising kindergarteners.

COMMUNITY COLLABORATOR

 Community partner will include Lee County Public School kindergarten teachers.

STRATEGY 2.2

SMART GOALS

 By FY 26, LCFS will increase the number of children participating in the Countdown to Kindergarten Program by 30%.

Objective Two: To ensure children arrive at school ready to learn.

 LCFS will recruit children from parenting programs, teacher referral from Bishopville/Lee Child Development Center and Wateree Head Start – Bishopville Site.

COMMUNITY COLLABORATORS

 Community partners will include Head Start, 4K Centers and other childcare programs where families have children who will be rising kindergarteners.

STRATEGY 2.3

SMART GOAL

 Ensure that each student enrolled in the CTK program receive six (6) home visits during the summer before school starts in FY 24.

COMMUNITY COLLABORATOR

 Community partner will include Lee County Public School kindergarten teachers.

Objective Three: Ensuring children arrive at school healthy and ready to learn.

STRATEGY 3.1

SMART GOAL

 Ensure that each student enrolled receive services to detect any development delays or health issues. LCFS will provide early childhood education services to pregnant women and children birth to 5 years.

COMMUNITY COLLABORATORS

Community partner will include Child Find, Baby Net and pediatricians

STRATEGY 3.2

SMART GOAL

 By FY 26, LCFS will increase the number of families in the Early Steps to School Success 10%.

COMMUNITY COLLABORATOR

Lee County Public Schools

Objective Three: Ensuring children arrive at school healthy and ready to learn.

STRATEGY 1.1.2

Improve the quality of health care before, during, and after the birth of a child.

SMART GOALS

- By FY 26, assure care addresses social determinants of health and risk behavior reduction in 2% of birth mothers enrolled in a health advocacy and support system.
- By FY 26, enhance population surveillance to determine receipt of guideline-recommended care in 2% of birth mothers enrolled in a health advocacy and support system.

COMMUNITY COLLABORATORS

 Community partner will include Child Find, Baby Net, pediatricians, and DHEC

Objective Four: Create a coordinated and Family-Centered Early Childhood System.

STRATEGY 4 1 6

Collaborate across agencies to pursue funding that results in additional investment in programs and services that benefit young children and their families or builds and strengthens the early childhood state system while ensuring the most effective and efficient use of state, federal and local resources.

SMART GOAL

 By FY 25, a collaboration across SC First Steps, Lee County School District and Lee County First Steps will open one child care center to serve 10 children of parents enrolled in the school district's Adult Education Program.

COMMUNITY COLLABORATORS

 Community partner will include SC First Steps, and Lee County School District

STRATEGY 4.3.4

Work collaboratively to ensure the county's home visitors and parent educators receive training, professional development and support that strengths their practices and enhances their services for families and children.

Objective Four: Create a coordinated and Family-Centered Early Childhood System.

By FY 26, the county's home visitors and parent educators
will participant in three annual trainings and professional
development opportunities to strengthen their practices and
enhance their services for families and children.

COMMUNITY COLLABORATORS

 Community partner will include SC First Steps, Save the Children, Lee County School District, National Parents As Teachers, South Carolina Association for the Education of Young Children (SCAEYC) and South Carolina Early Childhood Association (SCECA)

Overarching Measures of Success

- 1. INCREASE THE REACH OF FIRST STEPS SERVICES
 - By 2026, the percentage of children in need who are directly served by Lee County First Steps will increase from 17% to 20%.
- 2. INCREASE THE NUMBER OF CHILDREN ENROLLED IN HIGH INTENSITY PROGRAMS FUNDED BY FIRST STEPS
 - By 2026, the percentage of children in need who are directly served by Lee County First Steps high intensity programs will increase from 5% to 8%.
- 3. INCREASE THE AVAILABILITY OF HIGH-QUALITY EARLY CARE AND EDUCATION OPPORTUNITIES OFFERED BY FIRST STEPS
 - By 2026, the percentage of children under age 6 who benefit from Lee County First Steps quality enhancement and training efforts will increase from 12% to 15%.
