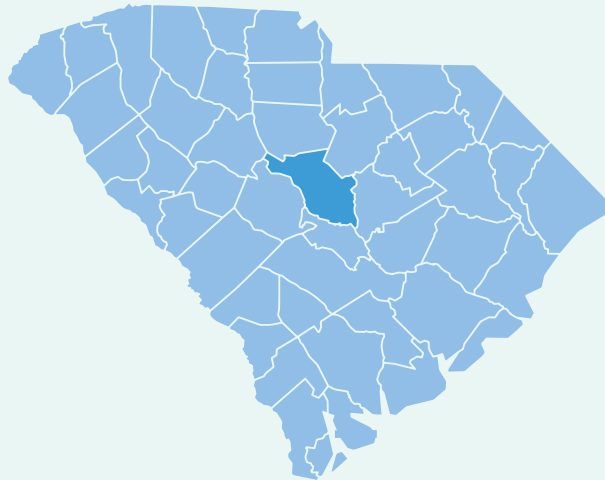

FINANCIAL HIGHLIGHTS

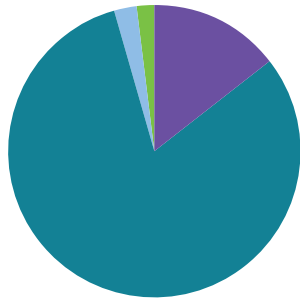


\$1 = \$3.38

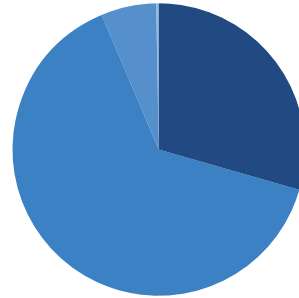
