OUR MISSION

To provide high-quality early education programs designed to meet the needs of the time that will ensure children in Barnwell County will arrive at first grade with the foundational knowledge and skills needed to succeed.

Barnwell County First Steps provides a full spectrum of programs and services to support the families of young children across Barnwell County - to help provide the foundation for all future learning, behavior, and health. We know that a strong foundation in early childhood helps children develop the skills they need to become well-functioning adults. We focus our work on the many collaborations and partnerships across the county to ensure that our families are supported and that all children start school ready to reach their highest potential.

During this program year, we had the opportunity to access federal ESSER funds and local champions like the James & Miriam Darnell Fund Committee to grow our Parents as Teachers home visiting program. This funding has allowed us to hire an additional parent educator, expanding the services to another dozen families.

We also get immeasurable support from the AmeriCorps program which provides two members to our partnership to support our other home visiting program, HIPPY - Home Instruction for Parents of Preschool Youngsters, and for family and community engagement. These AmeriCorps members provide services to us that benefit us in more than just a budgetary sense. They are key members of our partnership serving our families.

We also completed the work on our current Needs Assessment and Strategic Plan for 2024-26. This work will guide us for the next three program years. We identified the lack of licensed childcare providers as one of the biggest challenges that our families face currently in our county. We have begun the work, in partnership with the Barnwell Consolidated School District, to open a child development center in Williston in the fall of 2023.

Our greatest moments come at the end of events, or when a parent finishes a home visit and tells us that they didn't know what would happen when they started services with our partnership, "but wouldn't know what to do without us." That praise was given by a parent at the end of a Family Cafe session this past winter. We love to see our families thrive - to see their children begin kindergarten excited to continue learning.

We are always happy to talk to others in our communities that are interested in joining with us to provide the best foundation for our children as possible. Won't you join us?


