

I am happy to share some exciting results for our 2024 – 2025 year. Our Fairfield County First Steps programs closed out another year of success! Thanks to the work of our board, employees and community we have:

- Distributed over 4000 books
- Met with 42 families, providing a minimum of two home visits per month, through Parents as Teachers
- Provided childcare training to 32 teachers in six centers
- Read to over 400 children through our 1000 Books before Kindergarten program
- Served 35 families in the Parent Café program
- Made over 140 home visits in our Countdown to Kindergarten
- Provided First Steps information to over 80 additional families as a part of community events.


FINANCIAL HIGHLIGHTS


