# **Executive Director Message**

Marion County First Steps has had a very productive year. The 2017-18 fiscal year saw the Facility Quality Enhancement, Childcare Training, Childcare Scholarships, and the Literacy programs all implemented successfully. Each program met all South Carolina First Steps standards of enhancing childcare programs through regular technical assistance, affordable monthly trainings and affordable childcare to at-risk, impoverished children and families who were low-income or in need of assistance. The success in these programs was due in part to collaborations with childcare providers, knowledgeable instructors, DSS, local churches, and local businesses.

This year during the Week of the Young Child providers and facilities participated in our annual Marion County First Steps Childcare Provider of the Year award. This award recognizes a provider who delivers exemplary service and who works tirelessly helping the children of the community. Childcare facilities applied for their chance to be recognized, and after careful review and consideration, the winner was Ethel Ford. Ms. Ford is a childcare provider at Troy-Johnson Learning Korner. We would like to congratulate her once



again on her award. Even though teaching can be a thankless job, it is also fulfilling and rewarding!

Although Marion County First Steps has limited funds, every dollar is used to ensure that children and families do not have to worry about how they will be able to afford a childcare while they work or go to school. Rest assured, if they have at least one South Carolina First Steps-approved risk factor, they will be served in some capacity. When people donate, they know that we put the money into action by helping the smallest citizens of Marion County.

# THE GOALS

Our partnership's work, in collaboration with state and local partners, is focused on advancing Marion County towards these strategic goals in support of the *Profile of the Ready Kindergartner*, South Carolina's description of school readiness:

- **1.** Increase Literacy Program to serve 150 children by one additional coordinator in the faith-based and Head Start communities by 2020.
- 2. Increase the number of certified trainers in Marion County by 10%.
- **3.** Increase scholarships to 30 and serve children in hard to reach rural areas of Marion County by 2020.
- 4. Host Community Meeting Concerning Early Education.

# THE IMPACT

#### In 2017-18, Marion County First Steps provided:

**Over 800 children and adults** with **intensive support** to equip parents and caregivers with the confidence and competence to be a child's first and best teacher, and strengthen their family's health, economic, and overall well-being

- 5 staff working in 3 child care providers, Head Start centers and preschool classrooms with training, technical assistance, resources and support, helping them better meet the needs of 23 children ages 0-5 in their care Facility Quality Enhancement.
- Financial assistance to help **33** children 0-5 attend quality child care so their parents can work or attend school
- Nearly 4000 books to spark the love of reading for nearly 700 children (Raising a Reader& Family Literacy).
- A total of more than 800 children and adults were impacted by Marion County First Steps programs, resources, activities and events.



#### What is the KRA?

In 2017-18, kindergartners across the state were given for the first time South Carolina's newest assessment of school readiness: the **Kindergarten Readiness Assessment**, or KRA. The KRA provides a snapshot of students' abilities at the beginning of the school year, in four domains: Social Foundations, Language and Literacy, Mathematics, and Physical Development and Well-Being. Here are the results locally and for the state:

- 1. Language and Literacy: reading, writing, speaking, and listening
- 2. Mathematics: counting, comparison, and sorting
- 3. Physical Well-Being & Motor Development: dexterity, muscular coordination, and balance
- 4. Social Foundations: following rules, asking for help, task persistence and other skills necessary to function within the kindergarten classroom

**Demonstrating Readiness:** student demonstrates foundational skills and behaviors that prepare him/her for instruction based on kindergarten standards.

Approaching Readiness: student demonstrates some foundational skills and behaviors that prepare him/her for instruction based on kindergarten standards

*Emerging Readiness:* student demonstrates limited foundational skills and behaviors that prepare him/her for instruction based on kindergarten standards

The continuation of the partnership with Marion County Childcare providers will certainly improve KRA scores as we provide the literacy program, quality childcare trainings at no charge, Facility Quality Enhancement that will help providers to improve the services they provide in pre-school, and childcare scholarships which will allow at-risk impoverished children to receive quality childcare at an affordable price for their parents.

# **Family Literacy**

### Parents are their child's first and best teachers.

### **Program Description**

Raising A Reader (RAR) is a proven and evidence based family engagement and early literacy program for children ages 0-8. The program helps families develop, practice, and maintain the home based literacy routines necessary for school success. The goal or RAR is to substantially increase the number of families that share picture books and stories with their children frequently and routinely each week.

Our family literacy program:

- ✓ Foster healthy brain development.
- Enhance early language and literacy skills.
- Encourage parent-child bonding through read aloud
- Develop and foster print motivation

Marion County First Steps serves families in greatest need. Among our family literacy program families:

41.3%	live in poverty (2016)
17.1%	didn't graduate high school (2012-2016)
7.4%	unemployment rate (2017)

Parents have expressed great satisfaction in the program. As Marion County is a rural area, many parents do not have access to the county library. Raising a Reader offers an opportunity for parents to have quality literature to read to their children.

#### This year, our Family Literacy program:

- Increased the times the child asked to be read the book again.
- Increased the vocabulary skills of participating children by 18% according to the survey.
- Increase in adults watching a video about the importance of sharing books with your child.

#### Evidence of Effectiveness:

The Family Literacy components of Raising A Reader and early childhood education meet the First Steps legislation's definition of an *evidence-based* program.





In order to thrive, children need nurturing, responsive relationships and a supportive learning environment, both within and outside the home.

### **Program Description**

The quality of care they received by young children is crucial to their healthy development and school readiness. Child care providers strive to provide high quality care, but may lack the resources that are commonly available to publicly-funded early childhood programs, such as educational materials, on-site professional development, and other support.

First Steps' Child Care Quality Enhancement (QE) is intended to produce measurable improvements in the quality of care provided to young children. Participating child care providers must serve a high percentage of at-risk children, and are selected through a competitive process that requires a strong level of commitment to the QE process.

#### **Program Components**

- 1. On-site Technical Assistance (TA) at least twice monthly
- 2. Equipment and materials funding
- 3. Integration with locally available training, provided by First Steps and other partners
- 4. Workforce Development
- 5. Coordination with community partners
- Pre/post assessments of the classroom environment and teacher-child interaction, using nationally-recognized observational tools for infant/toddler and preschool settings (ITERS, ECERS, FCCERS)

#### This year, our Quality Enhancement program:

- ✓ 100% of participating FQE childcare providers participated in MCFS childcare trainings and found the trainings to be very beneficial.
- ERS scores for two of the three FQE childcare providers improved an average of .22.
- Provided 54 hours of technical assistance to child care providers
- Provided nearly three times the required Childcare Training Hours to FQE Childcare providers during FY18.

#### Too many families in Marion County cannot afford quality care for their children.

### **Program Description**

Access to quality child care is essential for children while away from their primary caregivers. Yet, of those families income-eligible for child care assistance in South Carolina, only a small fraction receive it due to lack of funds. In the absence of nurturing and consistently available family, friends or neighbors, parents are faced with few–or no– affordable care options.

Marion County First Steps serves families in greatest need. Among our scholarship families:

100%	live in poverty

70% ... Received Food Stamps

- 37% ... Received TANF
- 48% ... Parental Depression

In addition to regular monitoring of child care providers that receive First Steps scholarships, First Steps conducts at least one developmental screening each year with scholarship children and connects families to needed services within the community.

During FY18 MCFS successfully provided wrap-around services with childcare scholarships, Facility Quality Enhancement and Childcare Trainings.

# This year, our Family Literacy program:


- Increased the number of times parents read to their child(ren)



# **Raising a Reader**

Raising A Reader (RAR) is a proven and evidence – based family engagement and early literacy program for children ages 0-8. The program helps families develop, practice, and maintain the home-based literacy routines necessary for school success. The Spencer Scott, MCFS Executive Director and literacy coordinator were both trained in this program. Over \$10,000 was used to fund RAR.

Before the program started at the Academy of Early Learning, teachers were introduced to the program. There were also parenting classes to help parents understand the importance of reading aloud to their ch

understand the importance of reading aloud to their children.



Getting books ready for the red bags!

The parenting classes continued during the school year. Each class focused on a different aspect of reading.

At the Academy of Early Learning, 175 four year old students participated in this program. Students were given 4 age appropriate books in red bags to take home each week. Parents were encouraged to read the books with the children during "book cuddling". One parent wrote "Thank you for all four fabulous books. We enjoyed reading all of them-especially this one! It's our new favorite read!"

In May, students were given a blue bag to take home for the summer. The blue bag contained a library card application, bookmark with reading tips, and a RAR certificate signed by the executive director. The library card



applications were returned to the school and taken to the library. Children were mailed a library card during the summer.

The program is an integral part of the program at the Academy of Early Learning. Marion County is a rural area. This program provided books in the home to parents who can't go to the library. Also it provides a wonderful opportunity for parents to bond with their children. What better way parents should spend time with their children but through reading!

(5) mobilize communities to focus efforts on providing enhanced services to support families and their young children so as to enable every child to reach school healthy and ready to succeed.


